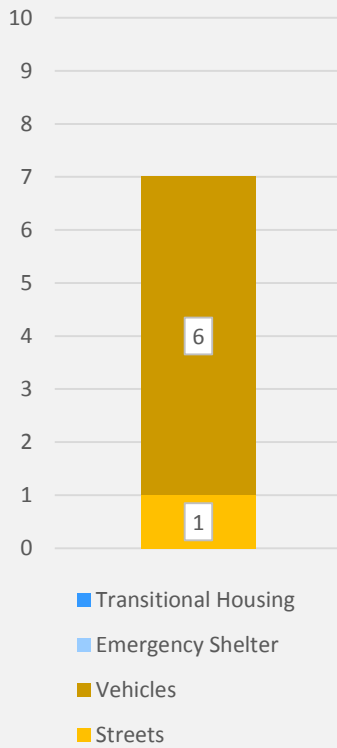

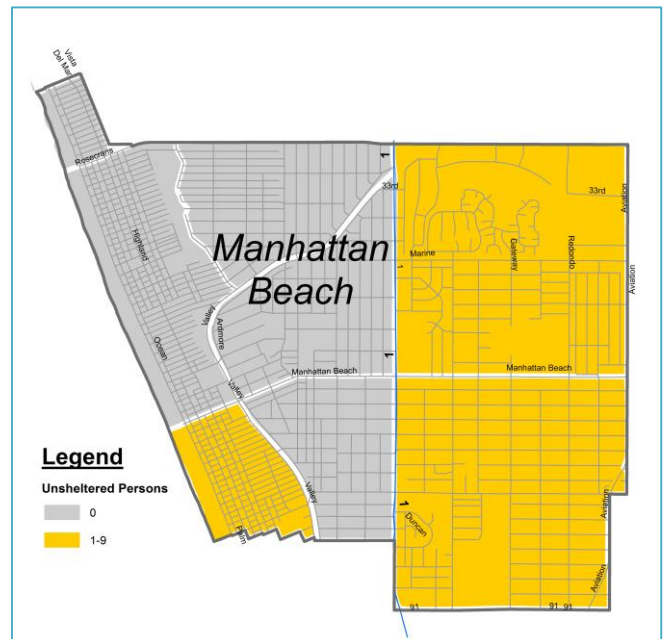

Manhattan Beach *7 Homeless Persons* on January 28, 2015

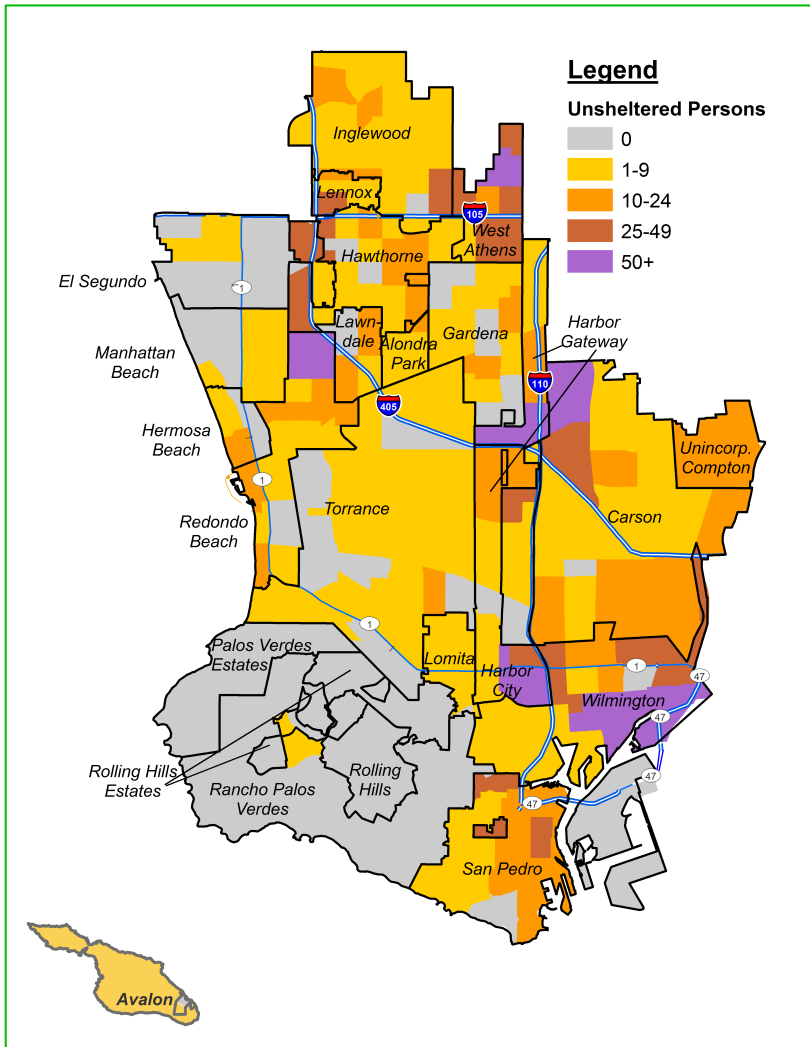
- 0.3% of the South Bay's Unsheltered population is located in Manhattan Beach (living in vehicles or on the streets)
- Changes from Homeless Count 2013:
 - Decrease in persons from 13 to 7
 - Decrease in persons in Vehicular homeless locations from 12 to 6
 - No change in "Street" homelessness with only 1 person found, both years

➤ Areas with the highest number of Unsheltered persons

- Rancho Palos Verdes (3)
- Manhattan Beach (7)
- El Segundo (12)

➤ Areas with the highest number persons living in Vehicles

- Wilmington (241)
- Harbor Gateway (131)
- Carson (124)
- San Pedro (89)
- West Athens (73)

➤ Areas with the highest number persons living on the Streets

- Wilmington (224)
- Inglewood (207)
- West Athens (204)
- San Pedro (157)
- Redondo Beach (97)

➤ 78% of the South Bay's homeless population were unsheltered during the 2015 Count

- 21% were in unincorporated sections of the region.
- But for six Permanent Supportive Housing programs, there would have been over 275 more homeless persons in the South Bay during the Count. By the end of 2015, roughly 300 more of these beds will be available in the South Bay.
