


2015 Greater Los Angeles Homeless Count

Persons Experiencing Homelessness by Location






- ➤ 10% of the South Bay's Unsheltered population is located in San Pedro (living in vehicles or on the streets)
- There are two Permanent Supportive Housing programs in San Pedro. But for them, there would be an additional 43 homeless persons in this area.
- > Changes from Homeless Count 2013:
 - Increase in persons from 287 to 376
 - Increase in Sheltered homeless persons (from Transitional Housing or Emergency Shelter) from 125 to 130
 - Decrease in persons in Vehicular homeless locations from 127 to 89
 - Increase in persons from Street homeless locations from 35 to 157

- San Pedro (157)
- Redondo Beach (97)

> 78% of the South Bay's homeless population were unsheltered during the 2015 Count

- 21% were in unincorporated sections of the region.
- But for six Permanent Supportive Housing programs, there would have been over 275 more homeless persons in the South Bay during the Count. By the end of 2015, roughly 300 more of these beds will be available in the South Bay.
